Company A, 746th Tank Battalion, was attached to the Division at 1700 hours.

Resupply

Eleven gliders carrying ordnance and signal equipment landed at STE. NERE EGLISE.

D PLUS 8 -- 14 JUNE 1944

The Division continued to mop up in the BAUPTE area and also passed through the 90th Division to attack west toward ST. SAUVEUR LE VICOMTE.

The attack, with the 82d Airborne Division on the left and the 9th Infantry Division on the right, originally was scheduled to begin shortly after dawn but was delayed until 1000 to permit units being relieved additional opportunity to seize the contemplated line of departure. The attack began at 1000 even though the line of departure had not been seized. The fighting was bitter, hedgerow-to-hedgerow onslaught, but considerable progress was made.

325th Glider Infantry Regiment

The regiment attacked at 1000 in column of battalions with the 3d Battalion leading. The 507th Parachute Infantry was to the regiment's right. As the scheduled line of departure had not been seized, the 325th attacked to the right of the 358th Infantry, 90th Division, instead of through it, but later swung in front of that regiment. The main highway due west of ETIENVILLE was strongly defended by the enemy, but he was driven off the road by 1830 hours after exceptionally hard fighting and repeated thrusts by both the 3d and 1st Battalions supported by one platoon of Company A, 746th Tank Battalion. The 1st Battalion continued to attack and advanced west 400 yards. The regiment consolidated its positions at 2100 hours, established firm contact with the 507th Infantry on the right and prepared to continue the attack to the west.

505th Parachute Infantry Regiment

The regiment remained in Division reserve. Company I moved to secure the ridge south of ETIENVILLE (PONT L'ABBE), holding positions at the north end of the bridge. Company H was attached to the 325th Glider Infantry Regiment at 1400 hours to act as Infantry escort for a platoon of Company A, 746th Tank Battalion through and beyond ETIENVILLE, but the company reverted to regimental control at 1940 hours. The regiment was ordered at 2100 hours to move into position 1,000 yards north of ETIENVILLE. Company I remained at the ETIENVILLE Bridge and established patrol contact with the 508th Parachute Infantry in the SEUZEVILLE LA BASTILLE Bridgehead.

507th Parachute Infantry Regiment

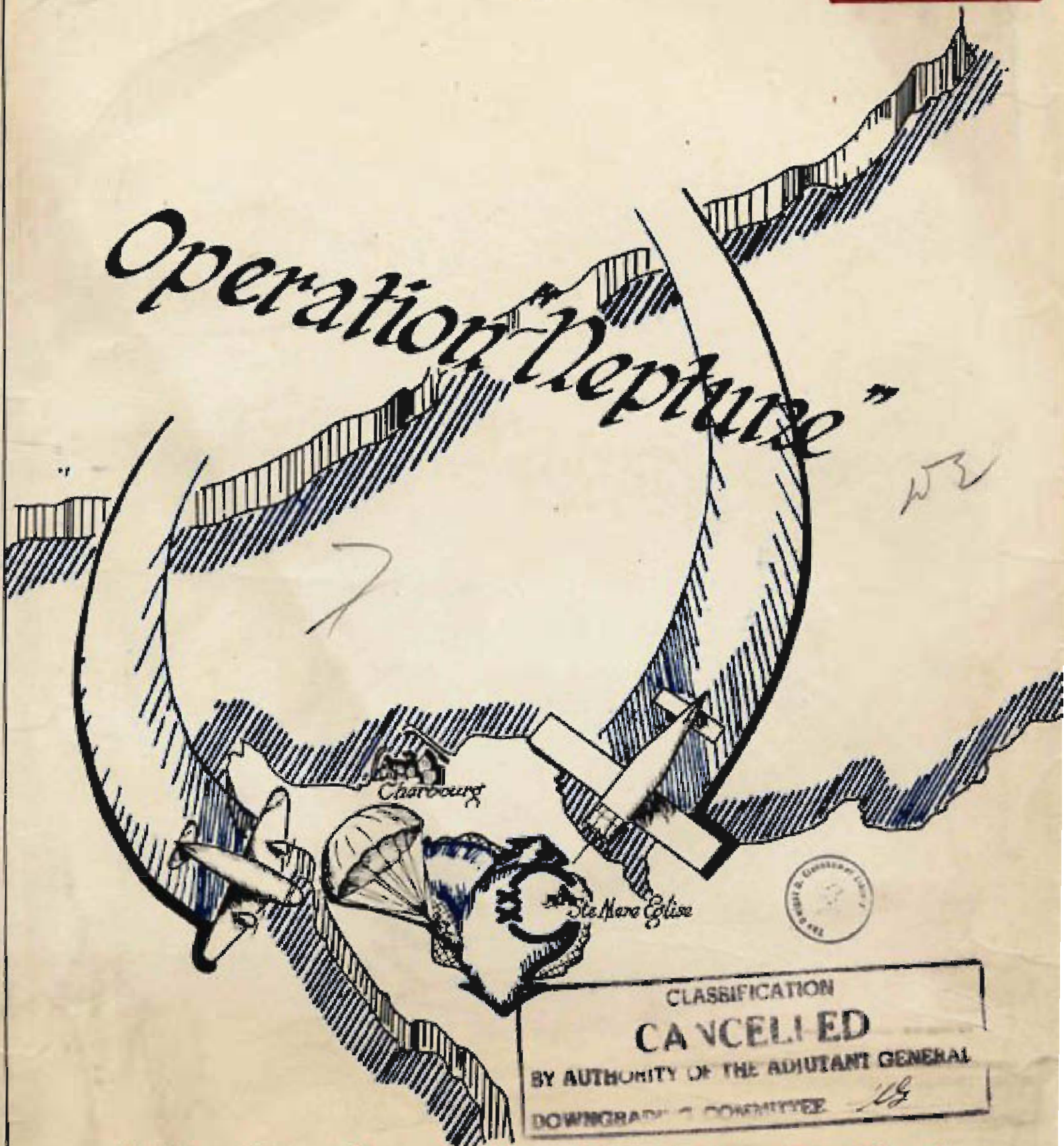
Attacking in column of battalions with the 3d Battalion leading, the regiment crossed the creek between REUF and ETIENVILLE at 1000 hours, passing through the 90th Division. The 325th Glider Infantry was on the left and the 60th Infantry, 9th Division, was on the right. Encountering heavy pounding of enemy artillery, the 3d Battalion turned north to block REUF and protect the north flank of the Division while the 9th Division spent the better part of the day seizing the town. Enemy resistance was severe. Counter-attacks in the evening were repulsed with the assistance of one platoon of tanks from Company A, 746th Tank Battalion. The 2d and 1st Battalions in that order, followed the 3d Battalion and continued the attack to the west, reaching the outskirts of LA BOUTEVILLE by 2200 hours. After consolidating positions and reorganizing, all Battalions prepared to continue the attack the next day.

next day with a force of 140 men. Major Pearson, Captain Taylor, and some men escaped subsequently and rejoined us. Major Pearson was in condition to fight.

The Regiment rested at La Fiere until D plus seven. During this time only action it saw was a bombing raid by the German Air Force which inflicted casualties. On D plus seven we moved to a field between Ficauville and Pont l'Abbe, Colonel Maloney commanding, Captain Creek commanding the 1st Battalion, Lt. Col. Timmes the 2nd, and Major Davis the 3rd. We were ordered to relieve the 90th Division which had just taken Pont l'Abbe, and to continue and attack to the West in the direction of St. Sauveur le Vicomte, the 325 on our left and the 9th on our right. At 0800 on D plus 8 we found ourselves in a column of battalions on the road marching up to the line of departure, 3rd Bn. leading, followed by the 2nd and the 1st. The 325 got on the same road we were using and some confusion and delay resulted. The Germans took advantage of that to shell us. But the 3rd Bn., in the lead, got to the line of departure in time to cross it at 0900. They took the hill mask in front of the line of departure in a brisk fight in which they lost the splendid Lt. Erwin, who had repeatedly shown his bravery to his fellow soldiers. The 3rd Bn., then turned north to block Renouf. Here they were subjected to a considerable mortar and artillery fire which lasted all day and inflicted casualties. The 9th Division which was supposed to take Renouf and cover the Regiment's right flank, spent the day trying to take the town, and finally did later in the afternoon with the help of the Air Force.

Meanwhile the 2nd Bn. followed by the 1st, continued to attack to the West. They made and kept contact with the 325 on the left and advanced 1000 yards with the vigor and speed characteristic of Col. Timmes' leadership, driving weak elements of Germans before them. Our artillery was very active, very powerful, and very encouraging, but not sufficiently flexible to adjust itself to the speed of Col. Timmes' Bn. At 1500 it came down on him. The Bn. was forced to take cover, and the officers thought that the barrage was heavier than any German

barrage they had been subjected to throughout the campaign. We had some casualties and withdrew, pending the lifting of the artillery, and discovered that the 9th Division by not coming up left our right flank exposed. Just then the Germans opened up with a machine gun and threw some confusion into the Bn which was already disconcerted by the impartially by which the Germans artillery dealt it's blows. The artillery lifted, we hustled the machine gun out of the house on the right flank, the 1st Bn moved up in the right and abreast of the 2nd; and the advance was continued until it ran into the Germans in position South and just east of Bonneville. By then the right flank of the 1st Bn was exposed also. The 325 on our left flank was stopped by the same enemy position. Col. Timmes and Captain Creek formed a plan together. Some tanks came up, and after an artillery preparation, Col. Timmes assaulted the enemy's position in front, using the tanks on the road to blast out the Germans positions, while Captain Creek enveloped them from the right. There was a hard fight on the German position but just as it was getting dark we were masters of the situation. The 325 attacked immediately and came up abreast of us. It was too late to do anything but bivouac on the battlefield which we did under one of the heaviest German shellings of the campaign.

Next morning, D plus 8 (June 15) at daybreak we resumed the attack and quickly pushed forward 1000 yards. There we were greeted with a shower of our own artillery which inflicted casualties, stopped the advance, and upset the men's feelings. The effects was very like knocking the wind out of a man, and it took some time to stop the artillery and more to get the men back in an aggressive frame of mind. That gave us time to notice that the 325 was not up on our left and the 9th Division on our right had not left their positions of the night before so that we were exposed on both flanks. Furthermore it gave the Germans time to set up a line of resistance so that when we finally did try to advance, we couldn't. That morning there was a heavy fight in which we mortared and machine-gunned each other vigorously. Casualties were high. The Germans brought up tanks which

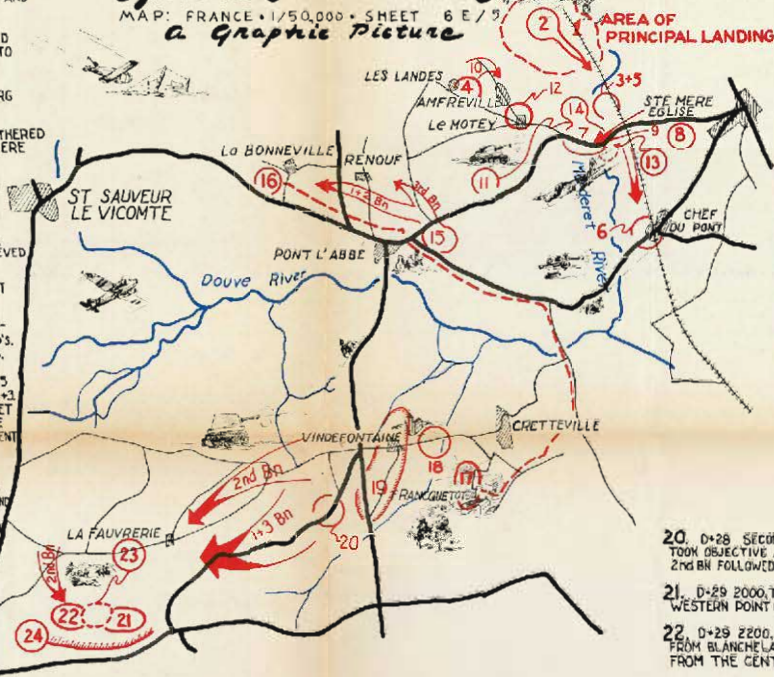

1. D-DAY 0230, MAIN BODY 507 PARA INF LANDED AND COMMENCED ASSEMBLY UNDER HEAVY FIRE.

2. D-DAY 0400, COL MILLETT LANDED, GATHERED 40 MEN AND ATTACKED AMFREVILLE. HE MOVED TO VIC LES LANDES AT 1300 THAT DAY.

3. D-DAY 0400, LT COL'S MALONEY AND OSTBERG ASSEMBLED 150 MEN.

4. D-DAY 0600, LT COL MALONEY MOVED AND GATHERED 400 MEN. CAPT SCHWARTZ-WALDER, CROSSED LA FIERE BRIDGE WITH 80 MEN OF G CO AT 1500.

5. D-DAY 0800, CAPT DICKERSON'S FORCE OF 300 MEN REMAINED IN RESERVE AT THIS POINT.

6. D-DAY 1200, LT COL OSTBERG MOVED TO THIS POINT WITH 75 MEN. CAPT CREEK AND 100 MEN TOOK CHEF DU PONT BRIDGE AT 2100. CAPT CREEK WAS RELIEVED BY 308 AND REJOINED THE REGT AT 0900 D+1.

7. D-DAY 2100-2400, LT COL MALONEY ENTERED FIGHT FOR LA FIERE BRIDGE WITH 400 MEN.

8. D+1 0900, ALL AVAILABLE MEN WENT INTO DIV RESERVE, AND THE REGT WAS REORGANIZED INTO 3 COS. CAPT'S RAE, BRANKENCKE AND CREEK COMMANDING.

9. D+1 1730, REGT COMPOSED OF 3 COS RELIEVED 503 AT LA FIERE BRIDGE AND HELD POSITIONS UNTIL 1015 D+3. AT THAT TIME CAPT RAE'S CO FORCED THE MERDERET AND TOOK LE MOTTEY AND HIGH GROUND NW OF THE LA FIERE BRIDGE. THE 325TH RELIEVED US AND WE WENT INTO DIV RESERVE AT 1300 D+3.

10. D+3 0030, COL MILLETT MOVED NE AND ATTEMPTED TO JOIN COL TIMMES WITH 450 MEN. AT THIS TIME COL MILLETT'S FORCE MET HEAVY OPPOSITION AND WAS SCATTERED RESULTING IN THE CAPTURE OF COL MILLETT AND 200 OFFICERS AND MEN. CAPT P.F. SMITH GATHERED REMNANTS CONSISTING OF 140 MEN, FOUGHT BACK ACROSS THE MERDERET AND REJOINED THE REGIMENT ON D+4.

11. D+3 1300, CONTACT BY PATROL MADE WITH LT COL TIMMES GROUP.

12. D+3 1800, REGT PASSED THRU 325TH AND RETOOK LE MOTTEY. 90 DIV RELIEVED REGT AT LE MOTTEY D+4. LA HAYE DU PUIS

13. THE REGT UPON RELIEF BY 809TH WENT INTO POSITION OF THE MERDERET, REORGANIZED INTO 3 BNS WITH A COMBINED STRENGTH OF 1037 MEN ON D+4.

14. D+4 LT COL TIMMES AND 125 MEN REJOINED THE REGT. THEY HAD OPERATED AS AN INDEPENDENT UNIT AND ON D-DAY ATTACKED AMFREVILLE WITH 50 MEN. AFTER THAT ATTEMPT THEY WITHDREW TO AND HELD A DEFENSIVE POSITION AGAINST REPEATED GERMAN ATTACKS.

15. D+7 THE REGT MARCHED TO ITS BIVOUAC AREA ON D+8, IT MOVED ON ORDER IN A COL. UMN. OF BNS. 3RD BN ATTACKED RENOUF AT 0900

AND WAS PASSED THROUGH BY 1ST & 2ND BNS WHO CONTINUED THE ATTACK TO THE WEST. THE 3RD BN CONTAINED RENOUF UNTIL RELIEVED BY THE 60TH INF AT 1800. 1ST AND 2ND BNS REACHED THEIR OBJECTIVES S OF BONNEVILLE AT DARKNESS.

16. D+9 1ST AND 2ND BNS ATTACKED WEST AT DAWN AND MET SERIOUS RESISTANCE. THEY HELD ALL GROUND GAINED UNTIL PASSED THROUGH AND RELIEVED BY 308. LOSSES IN 2 DAYS 192.

17. D+10 0400, REGT MOVED BY TRUCK TO RELIEVE 308 IN STATIC POSITION AT FRANCOUETOT.

18. D+12-13, THE 1ST BN FORCED A RIVER CROSSING AND SEIZED VINDFONTAINE AND C.R. TO THE WEST. THEY SUFFERED 34 CASUALTIES.

19. D+17 ENTIRE REGT TOOK UP POSITIONS AROUND VINDFONTAINE WITH THE 1ST BN HOLDING FRONT LINE POSITIONS.

20. D+28 SECOND BN UNDER DIV CONTROL TOOK OBJECTIVE AT LA FAUVERRIE. REGT LESS 2ND BN FOLLOWED ATTACK OF THE 325TH AT 0800.

21. D+29 2000, THIRD BN ATTACKED AND TOOK WESTERN POINT OF LA POTERIE RIDGE.

22. D+29 2200, SECOND BN ATTACKED SOUTH FROM BLANCHE LAANDE, DRIVING THE ENEMY FROM THE CENTER OF LA POTERIE RIDGE.

23. D+32 FIRST BN RELIEVED 325 AT 0900 AND SEIZED THE SADDLE OF LA POTERIE RIDGE.

24. D+32 507 ORGANIZED LA POTERIE RIDGE WITH OP LINE AS SHOWN. 8TH DIV RELIEVED 507 ON D+36.

25. D+39 REGT ARRIVED IN ENGLAND.
