of the 8th Infantry Regiment of the 4th Infantry Division at STE. MARTINE (384973) at 1000 hours and attacked north to clear the outskirts of STE. MERE EGLISE. The 1st Battalian withstock several counterattables and pushed the enemy, back to the eastern hand of the MEREMENTERY River in the vicinity of the NA FIERE Bridge. They were supported into in the day by one plateon of tanks from Company C, 745th Tank Battalian. At the close of the period, the 2d and 3d Battalians prepared to attack north toward NEWFILM AU FRAIM in conjunction with the 4th Infantry Division's drive on the right. The 2d Battalian, 325th Glider Infantry, was attached at 2100 to assist in this attack.

507th Parachute Infantry Regiment

The regiment moved into an area west of STE. MERE EGLISE in the vicinity of 335960, rested and reorganized. At 1600 hours the regiment moved into positions south of the LA FIETE - STE. MERE FOLISE Road west of the railroad to assist the let Battalion, 505th Parachute Infantry, against a threatened counterattack at the LA FIETE Bridge. At 1900 hours the 507th, at approximately 25 per cent strength, successfully pushed the enemy back to the west bank of the MERDERET River in its sector.

508th Parachute Infantry Regiment

One group near the railroad overpass (323960) moved into positions in the vicinity of the road junction 354972 to protect the Division's north flank-against enemy penetration. This group was in position by 0650 hours, but it later moved to join another group of the regiment in position defending the DHEP DU PONT Bridge. It morped up numerous enemy strong points surrounding that DU PONT and established patrol contact with elements of the regiment west of the MERDERET River on the high ground in the vicinity of 310040. The group proting high ground, now recognized as the 2d Battalion, had complete or genization of its position by 1300 hours, wiping out a number of enemy mortar and artiflord positions. A road block was set up on the western approaches to the fall During PONT Bridge and contact was astablished with forces in CHET DU PONT. Regimental strength at the close of the day was approximately 25 per cont.

82d Airborne Division Artillery

Various groups of the artillery were involved in individual skirmishes at the enemy as they found their way back to their parent units. The 310th Clinar Field Artillery Battalion assembled sast of SME. ERE ECLISE in the vicinity of 371974 with six 75mm pack howitzers. The 320th Glider Field Artillery Battalion was placed in direct support of the 505th Paracluta Infantry. After salvering two 105mm M3 howitzers and taking over the 75mm pack howitzer of the 456th Paraclute Field Artillery Battalion detachment with the 505th, the 320th went into position 400 yards west of STE. MERE EXITSE. The first round was fixed at 1011 hours. The seaborne echelon of the 456th Parachute Field Artillery Battalion arrived off Utah Beach but did not land.

Batteries A, B, and C continued to reorganize and by 1800 hours six 57mm antitank guns of Battery C and three guns each from Batteries A and B were in position covering the two bridges over the PROMET River. The remainder of the Battalion remained on board chips proparity to disembark on Utah Beach, we

The remainder of Company A landed by glider at 0700 hours and moved to join the 325th Infantry in the vicinity of CHEF DU POIT at 0930 hours. Bridges and culverts south of LE FORT (328518) and near LIEUVILLE (331905) were blown.




Germans had available. Under this fire we crawled into position on the heights overlooking the Merderet and dug in. With insufficient weapons to reply effectively we immediately replied with what machine guns we had, heping for the best. Between 2100 and 2200 three pieces of our division artillery opened up on the enemy, silencing them somewhat. The effectivenesses our artillery seemed to encourage us more than it discouraged the Germans. The Germans managed to keep up their intense fire until well after dark. At perhaps midnight their morter and small arms fire ceased, but their artillery continued to pound all night. The enemy troops proved to be elements of the 91st Infantry Division.

Next merning, D plus one, the regiment received an order to fall back on the Ste. Here Eglise Read and take up a position in support of the 505th which was being attacked from the north from the direction of Gourbesville. After being relieved by another battalien of the 505 we moved out at 0830 under sniper and artillery fire. At 1000 we reached our new position, rested, reorganized. Col. Maleney organized the fragments of the regiment with him into three companies commanded by Captains Creek, Rae, and Brakenecke. These officers in turn appointed plateon leaders within their companies.

At 1600 we received another order from Division to return to the bridge at
La Fiere in order to relieve the Battalion of the 505 that had been there all
day. As we assembled to move up, the German artillery descended upon us, following
our route of march up the road to the bridge.

Again in the same position we had occupied the night of D, and D plus 1, the Germans plastered us with mortar and machine gun fire. At first we thought we would be in for a hard time, but little by little the enemy fire died away and after dark it stopped altogether. Without doubt this was one of the most prolonged fires the Germans delivered against us during the course of the entire campaign. It had lasted uninterruptedly for thirty hours and reflected the


