## Sergeant Flynn

Sgt. Flynn, a member of a machinegun unit, was killed in action in France on June 9, three days after the start of the invasion, his mother was informed by the War Department.

His father, William Flynn, a Providence fireman, died three years ago. His only brother, Walter Flynn, a civilian employe of the Naval Air Station at Quonset Point, was killed in an accident there recently. Only the mother survives.

Deputy Police Chief James E. Murray issued a general order to the Police Department today telling of Sgt. Flynn's death.

"No details concerning his death are available," the general order said,

"but his record in this department and his advance to the rank of sergeant indicate his record after leaving here was an honor to himself and to our police force.

"During his connection with this department he performed his duties in a way to merit the approval of the superior officers that he served and he made the many friends that surround a young man of his fine character and genial disposition."

Flynn was appointed to the police department on Feb. 23, 1938, having been employed before that time by the Postal Telegraph Co. He was assigned to the Elmwood precinct and was on duty there at night until Oct. 19, 1941, when he was transferred to the traffic division and given the post at Westminster and Empire streets.

He left the department on May 14, 1942, to enter the Army. After three months of basic training he was transferred to England.

The patrolmen and sergeants of the day platoon shall wear the badge of mourning for 10 days, Deputy Chief Murray ordered.
