"Monty" Reviews 507 Honor Guard

Lieut. Crites, Demo Officer, Killed In Blast

Lost Life Clearing Booby Traps From Ruhr River

2nd Lt. Jack M. Crites, a demolition officer of Hq. & Hq. Company, was instantly killed in an explosion which occurred last Tuesday, May 29th. Lt. Crites, accompanied by Sgt. Brundige, Cpl. Griest and Tec. 5 Lewanski, were at the Power plant on the Ruhr river, clearing a log obstacle and passageway across the dam, which was suspected of being booby-trapped. While removing a log, an explosion occurred, killing Lt. Crites instantly. Splinters from the log struck Tec 5 Lewanski in the neck, face and arms. His wounds were serious enough to necessitate his removal to the hospital.

Lt. Crites joined the regiment on the 21st of May coming from the 6900th Re-inforcement Depot. He was formerly a member of the 82nd A/B Division and was commissioned at the Officer Candidate School in Paris.

Wants Victory Road Started at El Alamein To End in Japan

While flash bulbs exploded, Field Marshal Sir Bernard Montgomery reviewed and addressed an honor guard of the 507th Parachute Infantry at 1400 hours June 3rd, 1945 in front of the Essener-Hof Hotel in Essen. Preceded by a convoy which consisted of motorcycles, armored cars and jeeps equipped with sirens, the Field Marshal entered Essen in impressive fashion. The appearance, snap and bearing of the Honor Guard fitted in perfectly with the entrance of the distinguished visitor. The Field Marshal inspected the Guard immediately and expressed satisfaction at the military appearance. The top British Soldier paid a flying visit to the Villa Hügel and returned in about an hour and, at the request of Colonel Raff addressed the men, from atop the hood of a jeep. "Monty" stated that he has been "in this business for a long time." He traced his itinerary from El Alamein through Sicily, Italy, Normandy and finally Germany. He also expressed the hope of being able to participate personally in carrying the war to Japan. A note of the Field Marshal's personal feelings towards the Japs crept into his speech when he said,

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Four Combat Jump Veteran Declares Normandy Toughest

Pvt. Otto J. Carpenter, wire man of HQ & HQ company, has seen a lot of this parachuting business. The Rhine jump was his fourth combat jump. Carpenter came overseas in May 1943 as a member of 505th Regiment, 82nd A/B Division and was first battle-tested in the Sicily drop; he followed this up with a jump in Italy. D-Day found him dropping into Normandy. Incidentally, Carpenter says the Normandy campaign, in which he was wounded, was the toughest of them all and expressed his distaste for any more like it. Carpenter joined the 507th in February at Chalons.

Pvt. Carpenter has four years service, holds the Silver Star, awarded in Sicily, the Purple Heart, and is entitled to wear six battle stars on his ETO ribbon (that is beaucoup points).

The trooper, who hails from Butte, Montana, was married May 12th, to Miss Ethel Herbert in Leicester, England.

It took a 7 day furlough to bring S/Sgt. Lester Going, HQ 2nd, and Sgt. Leonard Crank together for the first time in three years. The two sergeants, civilians, life buddies, met recently at the Riviera on the first day of their 7 day furloughs.

Memorial Day Krupp Properties, Allied Prize, Offer Research On German-Nippon Industrial Power

The 507 observed Memorial day last Wednesday with a service held at the John T. Davis Rest Camp.

The program consisted of the opening prayer, reading of the names of deceased members of the regiment, Protestant service, a Catholic mass and the singing of the anthem, America.



Krupp von Bohlen is a sad man today as he thinks of what is left of the former great Krupp steel and munitions industries which he headed. Krupp is under house arrest, in a small section of his vast four hundred acre estate outside of Essen.

Since 1587 and for the following four generations, the Krupps have been one of the strongest and most dominant families of Germany. Its members have been judges, burgomeisters, merchants, diplomats and other public officials.

The founder of this great family was Frederick Krupp, who discovered a formula for hardening steel and making alloys. His son, Alfred, who died in 1887, employed and developed this formula to a great extent, making train wheels, locomotives, other vehicles and cannon tubes. The first Krupp factory was located in Essen and had about forty thousand employees.

The Krupp trademark, three connecting circles, exactly like the Ballantine Brewing Company's trademark seen in the U. S., denotes the millions of wheels of all sizes and types which they have turned out to keep German industry rolling.

The main Krupp steel mill is in Essen with another large one at Rheinhausen. There are about five other large Krupp-owned steel mills in various places, which are supplemented by other great and diversified holdings, such as the steamship lines in Kiel. As late as 1928 Krupp had between 110,000 and 215,000 employees working for him.

The Krupp family mansion, known as "Villa Hügel", is one of Europe's greatest showplaces. For centuries it has been a stopping place for visiting royalty and all types of other important domestic and foreign personages

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Highest Point Men To Leave June 8th for United States
